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The IMIA Broadens its Educational Scope in 2012 by Offering New Programs and Expanding the Annual Trainers and Administrators Symposia

"It is important for interpreters to have access to CEU quality educational workshops that allow them to accumulate the 30 contact hours needed to recertify every five years," stated Rita Weil, Chair of the National Board of Certification for Medical Interpreters.*

The **IMIA 8-Hr Medical Terminology Boot CampTM** is now coming to several cities in 2012. "*We* have expanded the program so that more interpreters can benefit from these great courses without needing to travel," stated Anita Coelho, IMIA Vice President. We also developed our first 4-Hour Advanced Boot CampTM Course titled **Interpreting in Difficult Situations – From Death to Profanity**TM. "*These advanced level courses will meet the gap for advanced level workshops in the field. They are not for the novice interpreter*, "stated Alvaro Vergara-Mery, PhD, IMIA faculty member. Every interpreter should have a Culturally Competency certificate, and this program will enable them to do so, easily from the comfort of their homes,"* stated Izabel Arocha, M. In the Fall, the IMIA will launch the **Language Access Leadership Academy.** The mission of the Leadership Academy is to reduce health disparities and transform the language access field, by developing and supporting our future leaders – ethical and innovative leaders who will advocate for language access for all language minority patients. "*We want leaders that will give back to the field to reduce disparities related to language access,*" stated Ira SenGupta, Executive Director of CCHCP, Cross Cultural Health Care Program, and one of the faculty members of the Academy. This will be an 8-month cohort blended learning program with a low enough student to faculty ratio to enable a mentoring environment and the development of relationships for an alumni network to last a long time.

After several years of offering free IMIA Trainer Conference Call Workshops to member interpreter trainers, in 2009, the IMIA decided to develop a **Trainers Symposium**. This one-day event took place in New Brunswick, NJ, followed by Las Vegas, NV, and in 2012 trainers will meet in New York City. Again the IMIA has been asked to expand its programming so this year the organization will offer a two-day event, May 31-June 1, with interactive forums in addition to expert presentations. "The Trainers Symposium is an important event, the only annual event in the field for trainers to get together and learn about best practices. The IMIA has been working in the past few years to standardize the training of medical interpreters, "stated Eric Candle, Adjunct Professor of Medical Interpreting, Licensed Trainer of Medical Interpreters and also IMIA Board member and National Chairs Liaison. What else is going on for trainers? The **2012 Trainers Calls** schedule is unbeatable. Trainers like the format of knowing what topics will be discussed and having a low-technology way of connecting to each other. The format involves a speaker giving a short presentation about a topic with most of the time devoted to discussion of strategies and ideas.

In 2010, IMIA added the Language Access Administrators Symposium to its cadre of events, with the first taking place in Miami, FL. This symposium focuses on the learning needs of administrators who hire interpreters as there had not been a face-to-face forum in the past. 2012 promises to be a great year for administrators with the **2012** Administrators Symposium taking place in Orange, CA, hosted by UC Irvine Medical Center. "*We know this will event will bring much needed expertise and strategies to those of us who run interpreter services*, " stated Karen , Manager of Interpreter Services at UC Irvine Medical Center. "*We are hoping to see an unprecedented number of participants this year from around the country*," she added. Experienced administrators will present the latest for those who want to learn and improve delivery systems. These events were the first to target specifically the secondary positions of the medical interpreter field, those of medical interpreter trainer and administrator. "*Our Interpreter Service Provider (ISP) Division and Trainer Division are really creating a home for administrators and trainers, respectively*," said Paul Penzo, Chair of the ISP Division.
